* Description	<p>The course of <i>English Grammar</i> is a compulsory course for the first-year English majors. The course starts from the second semester in each academic year. The coursebooks include 1) <i>A New English Grammar Coursebook</i> that was written by Zhang Zhenbang and published by <i>Shanghai Foreign Language Education Press</i>; and 2) <i>Longman Grammar of Spoken and Written English</i> written by Douglas Biber et al. and reprinted by <i>Foreign Language Teaching and Research Press</i>. Those two coursebooks are internationally recognized as authoritative references to English grammar.</p> <p>The course will be delivered in English. The course is designed to assist students in systematic understanding and analysis of a range of levels of English language as diverse as morphemes, words, phrases, sentences and discourses. 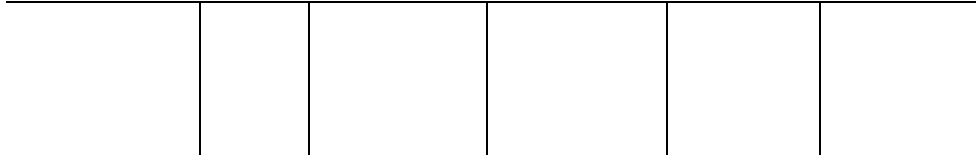
in-depth understanding will eventually serve to improve their accuracy of expression and to enhance their logics.

In recognition of students' prior knowledge of English grammar, the course will highlight the advanced aspects of English grammar while leaving peripheral facets to the students. This is because the course intends to well prepare students for more advanced learning in their academic years that follow. In addition to those exercises provided by the coursebooks, other classroom activities incorporate writing, translation, group discussion and peer correction.
