Description

This course is designed to familiarise students with the key concepts of sociolinguistics with a focus on the Labovian variation theory and the quantitative approach to the study of natural language data gathered in a range of linguistic and social contexts. This course will address different aspects of phonological, grammatical, and pragmatic variation, and language contact, focusing on key issues such as identity, contact, and language change. We will also look at the language use in the Chinese speech community and examine the implications of variation for SLA theory. Students will also apply the insights gleaned to an original study of a linguistic variable of their choice.
